How do you write a play about Jack the Ripper without making it about Jack the Ripper?

Killing Jack, a newly commissioned play from Sadie Hasler (Stiletto Beach, Misfits), is a darkly thrilling plunge into a world where women return to take back their stories; perhaps even to exact their own bloody revenge...

Like many people (surprisingly, mostly women) one of my guilty pleasures is cosying up at home and watching a nice programme about serial killers. Fred & Rose? Yes please. Ian & Myra? Cor, yeah. Jeffrey, Ted, Peter, Harold, Ed. And of course, all those with super cool names like Night Stalker, Monster of the Andes, and The Brooklyn Vampire. All the big boys of evil; a great evening of uncomfortable viewing. But none raises a chill in these parts more than Jack the Ripper. The Elvis of Murderers. For years in my head, because of the sledgehammer branding he

has received, he was a debonair gent with a top hat and nasty temper, incited to murder women to satiate his violent issues.

While reading a clickbait article I've since forgotten, I realised I didn't know how many women Jack the Ripper killed. I didn't know their names, who they were, or if they were (drumroll) even prostitutes at all. I just knew that this wily brutal man had fascinated the world with his incomparable talent for evading escape, albeit in the pre-forensic landscape of Victorian London. Was he an angry pauper, a butcher, a lunatic, the queen's doctor, or even her grandson and thus heir to the throne? Jack still had the knack, almost 150 years later, to keep a worldwide army of macabre enthusiasts on their toes.

No one play could ever give justice to the women who lived such heartbreakingly difficult lives and died such barbaric deaths. So, after almost a year of many drafts and beating myself up, I stopped trying. What good could I ever do these poor women? Which aspects of their five very different, wildly unique and fascinating lives should I even try to begin to boil down for a ninetyminute portion of 'entertainment'? Did I have the right to try?

Since I couldn't write a five-hour play, I decided the best I could do for them, aside from shining a light on them, showing them some love, and completely removing Jack the Ripper as the central character (a furious instinct from the start), was to try and do the best for women in general. Explore what has changed since their murders in 1888 changed the world. With their deaths they gave us a villain to love – Jack – and we gave them nothing.

As I researched, I quickly grew weary of all the usual Ripper bilge. The titillating depiction of the Ripper's prey especially annoyed me. The fact that four of the women weren't even prostitutes! As I began ignoring the countless resources written largely by men, I even guestioned whether I had picked a dud subject for a play. These male selfproclaimed authorities didn't give a fig for the women. I found myself sighing, rolling my eyes, and grinding my teeth on a very regular basis. But it wasn't boredom or ambivalence I was feeling, it was a frustration that would very quickly turn to full-bodied rage. Was this rage, then, the basis of the play that needed to be written?

Because what has changed since 1888? Women are still told, if we walk home alone late at night (or any time, depending on where you live), that we are "taking our lives in our own hands"...

Inevitably, thank goodness, I soon found *The Five* by historian Hallie Rubenhold and promptly stopped reading anything else written by a man about Jack the Ripper. I knew now that I did not actually care about the Ripper at all; I cared about the women. I couldn't – and wouldn't – read any more about them being prostitutes, fallen women, drunks, unfortunates, bad mothers or unrecognisable corpses. My empathy was now cast in a kind of warrior iron. I was not just ready to feel for these women, I was ready to fight!

But how do you write a play about Jack the Ripper without making it about Jack the Ripper?

Then it came to me, it was obvious! They could be us. We could be them!

Because what has changed since 1888? Women are still told, if we walk home alone late at night (or any time, depending on where you live), that we are "taking our lives in our own hands" (take a second to think about how wrong that saying is, apportioning blame to a victim) - for it is still so chillingly likely that something horrific could happen to us while we dare to take that chance. Some women, like those in 1888, don't have the means to secure their own safety.

Every night that we make it home safe, we are all the one who got away. Every single woman on this planet – present and future – is a few sad circumstances, some bad luck, one night on the wrong street away from being Polly, Annie, Liz, Kate, or Mary Jane.

A play in their honour is a drop in the ocean of what they deserve. But these remarkable women will never leave me now – they are real heroines with permanent residence in my heart. I hope they'll find the same in your hearts too.





Spotlight on...

working in partnerships with **New City College, Ardleigh Green**

Since May 2022, Queen's Theatre Hornchurch have been working in partnership with the Performing Arts team at New City College, Ardleigh Green to promote the arts and develop creative talent.

Senior colleagues from NCC are represented in FUSE: Havering, the Local Cultural Education Partnership (LCEP) for Havering which brings together education and cultural partners to transform the lives of Havering's young people, and better promote the value of culture in education. The partnership between the two organisations came about through connections formed in the LCEP.

The partnership aims to encourage collaboration and learning and give students the chance to improve their creative practice through workshops and performances at QTH. They've also seen first-hand how the Theatre operates and gained an insight into the diverse roles available within the performing arts industry.

Every year, we welcome new NCC Performing

The partnership aims to encourage collaboration and learning and give students the chance to improve their creative practice through workshops and performances at QTH.

Throughout the year, students get the opportunity to see a broad selection of QTH's produced work and perform on the Main Stage and The Other Stage. In the 2022 - 2023 academic year, this included a Main Stage Takeover for Performing Arts production of *The Addams Family* with an afternoon performance for local Secondary Schools and a sold-out evening performance to the general public; Re-wind evening of songs from the 90's and 00's by Music Students; and Music's End of Year sharing on the Main Stage. Last year, selected Performing Arts students also joined the intergenerational Community Chorus in Vickie Donoghue's The Flood, to add life on stage to the parties alongside the play's professional cast.

There are already plans in the works for this year's Partnership, which is expanding to include NCC Havering Sixth Form College and more opportunities to see theatre in non-traditional theatre spaces, through QTH's new schools and communities touring model.

The partnership is an example of QTH's investment in the local community and commitment to inspiring more young people to discover and love the arts.

"The highly valued partnership has been extremely beneficial to our NCC students and we are very grateful that the Queen's Theatre have been able to offer our students opportunities beyond the curriculum. Our NCC students have very much enjoyed watching a range of diverse productions at the Queen's Theatre Hornchurch which has informed their understanding of different practitioners, styles and approaches to theatre. Additionally, close collaboration with the technical team (Stage/Lighting/ Wardrobe/Set) has meant that our students have had the opportunity to engage with professionals from the industry which has inspired them to explore a range of roles for their future careers.
